Our school

- GLPS has an emphasis on academic success combined with the development of rich personal and inter-personal skills.
- The progress children make by the end of Key Stage 2 in reading, writing and maths is above the national average, placing us within the top 20% of all schools nationally.
- We have a **broad and balanced curriculum** and are passionate about children having many **different opportunities**.
- These opportunities include nativities, performances, choir, intergenerational project, baby watching, rock steady, spelling bee, digital leaders, school council, head boy and head girl, junior park rangers and restorative leaders.

Our EYFS Vision

 At GLPS, we provide a happy, safe and secure learning environment to enable all children to make progress. Our aim is to work in partnership with you so that together we can provide the best start to your child's school life.

We treat every child as a unique individual and provide learning experiences in a language rich environment, which allows each child to build on their own wants, needs and interests. Praise is at the centre of our ethos with an aim to build confidence and resilience in our young children. We also promote independence in our children to encourage them to follow their own goals in their learning. We hope that pairing this with high expectations will encourage all children to have high aspirations.







- We value the importance of outdoor learning and therefore we have invested in our outdoor classroom. We offer children the opportunity to develop their thinking and problem solving skills, as well as their language and gross motor skills through a range of different equipment and high quality interactions with our adults. This year, we are encouraging children in EYFS to wear plain black trainers as part of their uniform. This is not a requirement but we feel your child may have better grip and the wear and tear on these are better.
- Our brand new trim trail helps build our children's physical development and gross motor skills and allows children to take risks to build their confidence.
- Our bikes and scooters help promote balance and coordination, as well as sharing equipment and negotiating turn taking, which are all important skills for our children to develop.

 We visit forest school once a week, whatever the weather, to give children freedom, time and space to learn and demonstrate independence.







- Our indoor and outdoor environment supports our children to be engaged in purposeful play of their own choice and interests.
- We have dedicated areas of learning including construction, small world, role-play, sand, water, maths, literacy, creative and fine motor skills areas to name a few.
- Our children also have access to any resources on our open shelving units so they
 have the opportunity to return to their learning and build on it over the year.





• We have two Reception classes at GLPS, however, EYFS work as a shared team in a shared environment, getting to know all children equally. This allows for greater high quality interactions between children and adults in the moment, when a child is engaged in their learning. Our adults assess situations and are ready and available to listen, communicate, explain, demonstrate, question and move learning on appropriate to each individual child.

At GLPS, we want every child to enjoy coming to school and have a love for learning that will continue with them throughout their school life.





How children learn in the Early Years



- Child-initiated learning
- Adult-directed learning

Early Years Foundation Stage Framework:

"Every child deserves the best possible start in life and the support that enables them to fulfil their potential. Children develop quickly in the early years and a child's experiences between birth and age five have a major impact on their future life chances. A secure, safe and happy childhood is important in its own right. Good parenting and high quality early learning together provide the foundation children need to make the most of their abilities and talents as they grow up."

The EYFS is made of Primary School PRIME areas and SPECIFIC areas of learning

- PRIME AREAS of development and learning lay vital foundations in the Early Years:
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Communication and Language
- Physical Development

They are time-sensitive, particularly in the first three years of life but continuing throughout early childhood. Therefore, it is crucial that children's interactions and experiences in the first few years support development in these fundamental areas.

All three Prime areas are always in action for a young child. In every activity, the child is experiencing feelings and developing a sense of self and others, is physically engaged through their senses and movements, and is learning to understand and communicate with others. It is through these aspects that a child accesses the world around them and relationships with other people, which in turn opens the door to learning in all areas. The Prime areas therefore strongly influence learning in the Specific areas of learning and development.

SPECIFIC AREAS of learning

- Literacy
- Maths
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

Characteristics of Effective Teaching and Learning Great Linford Primary School

The Characteristics of Effective Learning describe behaviours children use in order to learn. To learn well, children must approach opportunities with curiosity, energy and enthusiasm. Effective learning must be meaningful to a child, so that they are able to use what they have learned and apply it in new situations. These abilities and attitudes of strong learners will support them to learn well and make good progress in all the Areas of Learning and Development.

The three areas are:

Playing and exploring

Children investigate and experience things, and 'have a go.'

Active learning

 Children concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties, and enjoy achievements.

Creating and thinking critically

 Children have and develop their own ideas, make links between ideas, and develop strategies for doing things.
